

While I'm writing this column, it's currently the last Tuesday in March. It is snowing lightly outside; fortunately, the snow is not sticking on the ground. Happily, the latest storm is passing to our south and is being pushed offshore; so, we have dodged the bullet. I still have patches of snow in my yard waiting to melt into the ground. Some of the creeks were frozen over, and the leftover snow made them inaccessible for the Fish Commission staff and volunteers to get close enough to stock trout. I watched Channel 13 news stories with Eric Weredyk and Scott Christman explaining the difficulties with the stocking because of the current conditions.

In school, my students today were asking me excitedly if I was ready to fish Saturday, since they are in Lehigh County. Remember Southeast counties have an early opening on March 29, the Saturday after our Banquet. Carbon County has only two creeks that allow fishing on the March 29 opener, Lizard

Creek (along 895) and Mahoning Creek. All the other water in that county opens April 12.

At our April 9 meeting, we'll have John Arway, Executive Director of the Pa. Fish and Boat Commission, as the guest speaker. The meeting will be held at 7 PM in the Monroe County Environmental Education Center on Running Valley Road.

April 12 is our annual Opening Day Kids Fishing Tournament at Brodhead Park from 8-10 AM. Each year, it seems to grow a little bit. If you want to have some fun without fighting crowds to fish, come down and help; I guarantee you will enjoy yourself. You can always fish later in the evening on the hatches.

During the day of May 14, Project Healing Waters veterans will be fishing at Indian Mountain Rod & Gun Club (Route 534 outside Kresgeville). The veterans arrive at 10 AM, and if you want to help give me a call. I stock the stream staring at 8 AM; we can always use more hands carrying buckets full of big trout!

Remember our May 14 meeting will be at an alternate venue ~ the Pocono Medical Center's Hughes Cancer Center, and our meeting will feature Marsha Benovengo from the Casting for Recovery program for women breast cancer patients. Please come out and show your support for their wonderful program. Perhaps some of you know someone who would benefit by attending one of their weekend outings and bringing them to this meeting will start them off with timely information.

I'm looking for volunteers to help on Saturday May 17 at the Friends of Cherry Valley Festival. This event will take place off Smith Gap Road. We need volunteers to help with fishing (They have equipment.), tying flies and teaching people the basics of fly-fishing. There is a stocked, cold, springfed pond on-site. This is a new area now open to public use, permitting hunting and fishing. Please call me if you can participate and lend a hand. If we have enough volunteers, for this event, I can make up a schedule and arrange small blocks of time according to your availability.

JOHN ARWAY, the Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission was appointed by our 10 Commissioners, and he is the Commission's Chief Executive Officer, as well as chief waterways conservation officer, and he has charge of all activities under the jurisdiction of the Commission.

Mr. Arway is a member of the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission, Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council, Pennsylvania Environmental Quality Board, Water Resources Council, and Wild Resource Conservation Board and an ex officio member of the Boating Advisory Board and the Northeast Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies.

Since taking the helm of the Fish and Boat Commission in March 2010, Executive Director Arway has worked tirelessly to raise public awareness of the plight of the Susquehanna River and to seek remedies for fixing it. Once considered one of the country's top smallmouth bass fisheries, the mighty Susquehanna River has struggled since 2005 to produce viable young of year smallmouth classes. In fall 2011, this troubling trend took on an added dimension, with adult smallmouth bass displaying unhealthy lesions. With support from various organizations, including PennFuture, the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, American River and

PA Trout Unlimited, Director Arway has repeatedly petitioned the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to place the river on the list of "impaired" waters and start the process of creating a pollution "diet."

Director Arway has experienced the decline of the fishery firsthand. A scientist by training, he has spent more than 30 years working for the Commission in various roles. As a lifelong angler, he has fished the Susquehanna since he was a youngster. It was quite common for anglers to catch 40 to 50 smallmouth bass in an evening. Sadly, many anglers now report catching only a handful on a good day. Many anglers have shared their stories with Director Arway through the Commission's website and a page about the Susquehanna River. Throughout the country, many fish and wildlife agencies face a similar challenge of retaining participants in their sport and attracting new ones. Director Arway has met this challenge by initiating a marketing program to highlight the sport to enthusiasts and novices, to men and to women, to adults and to children, to families and friends. The first initiative was launched Dec. 1, 2012, when the Commission began to offer 3- and 5-year fishing licenses. As an added incentive, anglers who purchase a multi-year license also receive an online, digital subscription to the Commission's flagship publication, *Angler & Boater* magazine. A separate website – www.GoneFishingPa.com – offers additional benefits. Anglers can enter a sweepstakes to win guided fishing trips and get access to numerous coupons for free goods, cost savings and discounts.

Director Arway has often stated that one of his ultimate goals is to *reduce* the price of a fishing license, which he believes would


entice lapsed anglers to return to the sport and encourage a new population to take up the sport. To lay the groundwork for this proposal, Director Arway has initiated multiple efforts to fund alternative funding sources for the agency. Under his direction, the Commission launched a Natural Gas and Water Access Program, which secures revenues from selling natural gas from under Commission property and from leasing rights to withdraw water from Commission Property. Also, Director Arway is actively seeking legislative support for his proposal to charge for the privilege of withdrawing water from any Commonwealth waterway.

Because many Commonwealth issues – such as the health of the Susquehanna River and the restoration of American shad – have impacts beyond state borders, the Commission benefits from participation on boards and committees at the national level. Director Arway keeps Commonwealth issues at the forefront of national discussions by representing the inland states on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Sport Fishing and Boating Partnership Council1; by serving on the Executive Committee of the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (AFWA)2; and by chairing the AFWA Angling/Boating Participation Committee3. He is also a member of the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission4 and the Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council 5.

A native of North Huntingdon, Mr. Arway holds a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Pittsburgh and a master's degree in biology from Tennessee Technological University. He holds memberships in numerous organizations, including the American Association for the Advancement of Science; American Fisheries Society (Past President of the Northeastern Division and Pennsylvania Chapter); North American Benthological Society; Ducks Unlimited; Pheasants Forever; BASS; the SONS of Lake Erie; National Wildlife Federation and life member of the Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs, National Trout Unlimited (Lloyd Wilson Chapter) and the Conservation Officers of Pennsylvania.

Please plan on joining us to meet and greet PFBC Executive Director Arway; so, **mark your calendars NOW** and be sure to attend the **April 9, 2014** meeting of the Brodhead Chapter of Trout Unlimited at our usual meeting location: the Monroe County Conservation District's Environmental Education Center at 8050 Running Valley Road, Bartonsville. This meeting will provide YOU with a real opportunity to get up close and personal with the PFBC's Executive Director himself. The contest is part of the chapter's ongoing effort to raise money for the various conservation and restoration projects currently being pursued and offers participants the chance to **win one of three fabulous prizes valued at up to \$100 dollars, including a first place prize of a \$100 bill (e.g. – "a Benjamin!")**

Contest rules:

- 1. Participants will be required to submit 3 flies (recipes for each fly are included with the entry form):
 - a. Royal Wulff
 - b. Bead Head Prince Nymph
 - c. Mickey Finn
- 2. Submissions can be made as follows:
 - a. Flies may be submitted directly to any Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited board member at any of the Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited functions
 - Flies may be mailed to Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited Fly Tying Contest c/o Scott Cesari's Fly Tying, 1986 Totts Gap Road, Bangor, PA, 18013
 - c. A \$5.00 entry fee made payable to Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited must accompany all entries
 - d. March 7, 2014 is the deadline for entry submissions
 - e. All flies submitted become the property of Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited for use in various chapter activities
- 3. Flies will be judged by Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited board member Scott Cesari (2006 Pennsylvania State Fly Tying Champion and 2006 Federation of Fly Fishers World Champion.) Judging will be based on a point system that quantifies the pertinent characteristics of each fly. A rubric for the scoring system can be viewed on the Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited website or at www.scottcesariflytying.com.
- 4. Prizes
 - a. The contestant achieving the highest point value will be the **first place** winner and will receive **a \$100 bill cash prize** (a "Benjamin.")
 - b. The contestant achieving the second highest point value will be the second place winner and will receive a set of fly tying materials valued at approximately \$75
 - c. The contestant achieving the third highest point value will be the **third place** winner and will receive a **\$50** amazon.com gift card
 - d. In the event of a tie, final determination will be at the discretion of the judge
- 5. The winners of the contest will be announced at the March Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited general meeting. Participants need not be present to win. Winners will be notified by email or phone if not present. Prizes can be delivered to the contest winners or mailed if the winner lives outside of the Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited region.

Bead Head Prince Nymph

Hook: size 12 2XL nymph hook Thread: black Head: gold bead Tail: rust biot Body: peacock herl Rib: oval silver tinsel Throat: brown hackle Wing Case Strips: white biots tied in a "V" orientation



Mickey Finn

Hook: size 8 streamer hook Body: silver mylar Rib: oval silver tinsel Wing: yellow over red over yellow bucktail, with the top yellow bunch equal to the combined girth of the bottom yellow and red bunches



Rt. 33 SOUTH - 1st Wind Gap Exit. Turn right at Stop sign. Continue to 1st road on left—<u>Mountain Road</u>. Follow Mountain Road 2.5 miles to Refuge entrance on right.

Points WEST

Sportsmen Alliance for Marcellus Conservation

Here's an update on this week's Legislative session in Harrisburg.

Sportsmen were critical in delaying consideration by legislators of House Bill 1576, the Endangered Species Coordination Act, which was slated for a vote the week of March 10.

At this point, the original bill is not likely to be voted on in its current form. TU staff will continue to closely follow the progression of this bill and threats to Pennsylvania's fish and wildlife, and will be ready to mobilize our membership and other sportsmen and women when needed to make sure that wild trout streams and sensitive species are protected.

Thank you for all you've done so far to help this effort. We need to remain vigilant, however, and continue to let our representatives know that HB 1576 and other bills like it are not a good thing for sportsmen, habitat and species in Pennsylvania.

elcome to the Fly of The Month! We are coming into the home stretch of my Pocono Patterns project, with just this and next month's FOTM columns left in the Pocono Patterns series. This month's topic features the set of flies that were tied and named for specific waters and areas of the Pocono Mountain region. The patterns were found in the 1960 book *The Fisherman's Handbook of Trout Flies* by Don Dubois. This ambitious work catalogs and organizes the recipes of nearly 6000 flies, including the Pocono flies featured in this section of my research project. In this particular FOTM column, I will explain how to tie the *Swiftwater*, originally tied by Fred Brown and named for the Swiftwater Creek. For further details on the 11 Pocono patterns documented in Dubois book, visit the Pocono Patterns section of my website at <u>www.scottcesariflytying.com</u>. For now, let's tie the *Swiftwater* (specifically, the "A" version in Dubois' text.)

<u>TYING THE SWIFTWATER A</u>

Recipe:

Hook: standard wet fly, size 12 Thread: black Body: peacock herl ends with orange floss midsection Throat: brown hackle Wing: grey barred mallard

Tying Steps:

Step 1:

Tie the thread onto the hook just behind the eye and wrap a thread base to the bend. Leave a long tag end of thread and do not clip it off.

Step 2:

Tie in a small bunch (5 or 6 strands) of peacock herl at the bend. Return the thread a little less than a third of the way back toward the eye of the hook and leave it hanging there.

Step 3:

Twist the peacock herl along with the tag end of thread into a rope. The tag end of thread will reinforce the herl. Now wrap the peacock herl rope in touching turns to the point where the thread is hanging (you may have to periodically re-twist the herl rope to maintain its integrity.) Tie down the herl at this point and continue to bind it along the shank of the hook another third of the way to the eye of the hook. Your thread should now be hanging at a point one third of the shank length back from the eye of the hook. Do not trim the peacock herl rope just yet. Step 4:

Tie in a piece of orange floss at this point and wrap the floss over the thread base you just created in the middle third of the shank. Wrap back to where the peacock herl was initially tied down and then wrap forward again to where the peacock herl is currently tied down, creating a double layer of floss over the middle third of the shank of the hook. Tie down the floss and trim the excess. Advance the thread past the peacock herl rope to a point just behind the eye of the hook (don't bind down the peacock herl rope in the process.)

Step 5:

Wrap the remainder of the peacock herl rope in touching turns to the point where the thread is hanging and tie it off, trimming the excess rope at this point. You should now have a body that has a midsection of orange floss with a section of peacock herl on either side of it.

Step 6:

Tie in a bunch of brown hackle barbs underneath the hook just behind the eye to create a beard hackle.

Step 7:

Tie in a bunch of grey mallard barred feather barbs on top of the hook for a wing. The length of the wing should extend to the bend of the hook or just beyond.

Step 8:

Create a small thread head, whip finish, and cement. Take your fly to the Swiftwater Creek and fish it on its namesake, you'll see why it was created to fish this particular stream!

NLIMITED

Tune in next month for the conclusion of my Pocono Pattern segments; it's one you won't want to miss! The final section details the flies created by our contemporary fellow anglers to fish our home waters, the most current proven patterns presently being tied and tried!




