2013 has been a fantastic year for Brodhead

TU! This past year we have been busy with many projects and events. Our members assisted the veterans who participate in Project Healing Waters. The veterans had trips to Lackawanna State Park, Arrowhead Lakes, and two on-stream sessions at Indian Mountain Rod and Gun Club, to name a few spots where they fished. We have been having a good turnout of volunteers from our chapter to assist with this program. I want to thank all who have been coming. This is not only a great time with the veterans, but a chance to meet people from the Stanley Cooper and other chapters to share fellowship.

We staffed and instructed the Monroe County Environmental Education Center's Fly Fishing Seminar in March. Chapter volunteers tied flies to be raffled, and taught all the sections of the program. Will Daskal provided an introduction to entomology. Several members gave the people the opportunity to try casting in the parking lot.

The next month, we discovered that Carl Meyer retired from the conservation district. We wish to thank him for all the support he has given to our programs. I worked with him each summer at

conservation camps, demonstrating fly fishing as the Thursday afternoon program. Carl and I always coached the campers through their first attempts at casting a fly line. It was very strange not to have Carl with us when we were at camp this past summer. **Carl you will be missed!**

We changed the weekday and site for our annual banquet this past year. The members and guests had many positive comments about the venue and the buffet style of serving. We also received some excellent critiques on the raffle format and ticket sales. This year, we will be using a new raffle prize ticket format, which we are adopting due to requirements of the small games of chance license regulations.

The annual Opening Day Knights of Columbus, Stroud Township, Brodhead Trout Unlimited and Fish Commission Kids Fishing Tournament was well attended by youth fisherman, parents and volunteers. It was as usual a great success. Once again, Will Daskal did a live painting demonstration, and the painting was raffled off to one of the attending parents, with all the proceeds donated to the Chapter by Will. In the past two years alone, that donation has exceeded \$300! As always, Alex and JoAnn Zidock were on hand to record the event for TV broadcast on their weekly BRCTV show, *Out in the Open*.

We sent two youth to the Rivers Conservation School at Allenberry Resort in Boiling Springs Pa., Katy Stanovic and Cole Bernier. Cole received the highest award given to a camper at the school. Both Cole and Katy helped teach the conservation campers in July. We are extremely proud of their outstanding achievements.

Last spring, we worked with Tobyhanna Conservation Association to plant trees near the new bridge on PA State Route 423 to protect the Tobyhanna creek providing shade and bank stabilization. A local Boy Scout Troop also joined in with the planting.

Once again, Will organized a very successful trip to the Catskill streams in May, with the entire group enjoying three days of good fishing. Don Baylor arranged a very successful trip to Colorado with a small group of TU members. He then put a slide show for the October meeting.

John Smith and Will Daskal attended the TU Northeast Regional meeting in Windham N.Y. during July. They came back with a lot of energy to improve the chapter. Will just authored our Chapter Strategic Action Plan, which we will be posting on the website in the spring. It should be posted by February; so, please be sure to read it so you can comment on it prior to our ratification vote later this spring!

PATU honored our chapter at the all PATU Fall Conference in September giving us the Award for Best TU Chapter Newsletter! The editor of our newsletter, *Streamside Asides*, is Will Daskal, and he has been doing a fantastic job taking it from print media to an electronic format for the web.

We received an Embrace a Stream Grant through the herculean efforts of Don Baylor and Don Miller. We will be placing educational signs in the Paradise and Cranberry Creek watersheds to encourage releasing of wild brook trout. They have been working with various township officials to encourage catch and release regulations wherever possible.

We coordinated with Rep. Rosemary Brown's Office, the Pike-Wayne Chapter of TU and the PA Fish and Boat Commission to conduct a Peck's Pond Clean-up, with full newspaper coverage by the *Pocono Record*.

We also cooperated with Brodhead Watershed for another McMichael Sojourn in the fall. Next year, we will be working in cooperation with BWA on the McMichael just downstream of the bridge on Manor Drive behind the soccer fields. Eric Baird is already working this plan. We have been out to the site to work on preliminary planning and taking pictures to accompany permit applications.

In March, we will be having a general membership meeting at East Stroudsburg University, featuring renowned fly-fishing expert Aaron Jasper as our guest speaker. <u>This will be the first</u> <u>time we are having a March general meeting in addition to the annual March Banquet.</u> The meeting is being held on campus at ESU to encourage a college-level student club which we hope will evolve into a college TU chapter associated with our Brodhead Chapter. This will hopefully encourage students to work with us on projects, as well as to join our chapter as student members.

Don Baylor and Don Miller are working on the initial planning for stream improvements on the new sections of the Brodhead that will soon become available to fisherman. They are trying to encourage special regulations in the area. One landowner, who is permitting access, would like to allow catch and release only. This area was recently purchased with a building that will have parking for access. The building will become the new BWA headquarters and house a local fly fishing museum.


There will be committees arranged to support these projects with plenty of room for members to help with the many projects. Board members will each chair committees, and we will need members to help out in many capacities.





The Cumberland Valley Chapter of Trout Unlimited is holding the 20th annual Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp June 15 - 20, 2014, at the Allenberry Resort.

The Cumberland Valley Chapter of Trout Unlimited is holding the 20th annual Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp June 15 - 20, 2014, at the Allenberry Resort in Boiling Springs, PA. The camp begins on a Sunday and ends the following Friday.

The highly structured curriculum is based on college level classes. Students are instructed in ecology, aquatic biology, geology, hydrogeology, erosion and sedimentation control, ichthyology, riparian corridor protection, watershed management, entomology, and much more. Students also participate in a hands-on stream habitat improvement project. But it's not all work. There are 10 fishing sessions and fly tying instruction. Over 30 instructors, all experts in their field, teach the various classes.

Admission will be limited to 32 selected qualified students, ages 14 to 17. The applicants must have been born between June 20, 1996, and June 15, 2000. The 32 students will be selected through an application process where they must state why they want to attend camp. The competition for admission is fierce.


The camp tuition is \$350 per student for the entire week. All meals and accommodations are included for the residence camp. A student need not be an accomplished fly fisher or a budding aquatic biologist to attend. All the student needs is to be highly motivated and willing to learn.

The Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp was founded in 1995 through the efforts of the late Dr. John R. "Jack" Beck and the late Enoch S. "Inky" Moore, Jr., Pennsylvania Fish Commissioner. Their goal was to select 32 teenagers each year who were the leaders in their class. The thought is that today's leaders in high school become the leaders of tomorrow's communities. In a few short years, they will be the bankers, lawyers, realtors, municipal officials and the leaders in their communities. If the camp can implant a kernel of knowledge in today's students about the importance of clean water, when those students become the decision makers in their communities, it may have a positive impact on how water resources are used.

The camp will begin accepting applications for the 2014 camp on November 1, 2013, and all applications must be postmarked no later than March 31, 2014. 



Hook: Standard Wet Fly, 1x or 2x, size 12 to 20

Thread: Olive

Tail: Dun Hen Hackle Fibers

Body: Olive Dubbing, tied as described in a dubbing loop

Hackle: Dun Hen Hackle Feather


THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF JAMES LEISENRING - MORE THAN JUST FLIES...

The contributions offered by Jim Leisenring. Leisenring lived in Allentown, Pennsylvania in the early to mid 1900's and fished the Analomink section of the Brodhead Creek, where many of his flies were tied and tried. Of all the research I've done on **this project**, I **think the information I uncovered about Jim's flies and his contribution to fly tying** and fly fishing have proven to be the most interesting. Leisenring developed a class of flies, the flymphs, versus a particular fly, and he contributed to the fly tier's arsenal of tying techniques as well by introducing the dubbing loop technique. The evolution of his work can arguably be traced back to the very first English writings on fly fishing. For the full details of Jim's contributions, visit the

It's a fascinating snapshot of Pocono angling history, well worth the read. As Jim is primarily known for his flymph patterns, it is the flymph that I have chosen for this month's FOTM.

TYING THE OLIVE FLYMPH



As the flymph is a classification of fly versus a specific pattern, the steps below illustrate how to tie this type of fly. The flymph is designed to imitate the emerging adult, somewhere between the nymph and the adult stage, as it is rising to the surface. Insects in such a stage are vulnerable and more apt to be taken by trout. Note that the dubbing and hackle can be varied in color and consistency to produce specific results to better match the insects of the water you are fishing. Ribbing and tags can be added as well, but not a wing case. Part of Jim's philosophy is that the flymph is tied "in the round," that is to say, without any features that would identify a top or bottom to the fly. As such, his flies could drift in the water current without appearing to be in an unnatural, or upside down, position, which Jim believed might spook wary fish since naturals rarely drift upside down. For instructional purposes, I have chosen to tie an olive flymph for the FOTM, which would represent an emerging blue winged olive.

<u>Step 1</u>

Start the thread on the hook and create a small thread base just behind the eye. Strip the fluff from the butt end of a hen neck hackle and tie this in on top of the hook with the feather facing forward, over the eye of the hook.

Step 2

Wind the thread in touching turns to the bend of the hook and tie in a tail of soft hackle barbs. The tail should be short, approximately the length of the shank of the hook. Then tie in one of the previously made dubbing loops (see sidebar), also at the bend of the hook. Return the thread to just behind the eye.

Step 3

Wrap the dubbing loop up the shank to create the body and thorax of the fly. Your initial wraps can be more widely spaced to yield a sparsely dubbed body which allows the color of the tying thread to show through, creating a more realistic two-toned appearance to the body of the fly. Wraps can be applied closer together in the thorax area to yield a more natural profile. Tie the dubbing loop off just behind the eye and trim the excess. Now wrap your thread back through the dubbing to near the midpoint of the shank. Do this in one very open turn of thread if possible so as not to compress the dubbing in the thorax region too much.

<u>Step 4</u>

Grasp the hen neck feather by the tip (use hackle pliers if needed) and make three to five wraps of hackle from the eye back to the midpoint of the shank where you left your thread hanging. Your first two turns of hackle should be very close together, almost touching, with subsequent wraps being spaced progressively further apart to create the correct density of hackle. Tie the tip of the hackle off with one or two wraps of thread, trim the excess, and then work the thread in a few open turns back through the hackle fibers to the eye of the hook. Wiggling your thread back and forth as you make these wraps will minimize the number of barbs you trap during this process. Create a small thread head in front of the hackle and tie off with a whip finish. Apply a drop of head cement and your flymph is ready to fish!

SIDEBAR - THE DUBBING LOOP, LEISENRING-STYLE

Jim Leisenring introduced the dubbing loop technique. At least, I did not find any references pre -dating Lesenring's use of it during my research. The technique has evolved, and the dubbing loop used today is not quite the same as that introduced by Leisenring. He created his loop off the hook by applying a generous coat of dubbing wax to a piece of silk (or tying thread) and resting the silk on the top of his thigh such that one half of the silk was on his thigh and the other half was hanging down over the front of his knee. He then covered the silk on his thigh with small wisps of dubbing. Leisenring applied his dubbing sparingly as he felt it was desirable for some of the thread to show through the body of the fly to create a two-toned, more realistic effect. He secured the length of silk on his thigh at one end with his thumb and at the other end with one finger. He then took the end of the thread hanging off the front of his knee with his opposite hand and folded it back on itself, slipping it beneath his thumb and finger without losing tension, effectively trapping the dubbing between the two halves of thread. By grabbing the ends and spinning them in opposite directions, he created a rope of dubbing, the original dubbing loop. Leisenring stored these dubbing loops for future use on celluloid automotive curtain cards with notches cut in each end to hold the loops securely. A 3 x 3 inch piece of mat board with notches cut in each end works just as well for the contemporary tier.





PA Waters Announced for 2014 Mentored Youth Fishing Days

HARRISBURG, Pa. (Dec. 18) – The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) today unveiled the waters which will be included in the 2014 statewide expansion of the popular Mentored Youth Fishing Day program.

"Think of this as a holiday gift for kids," said PFBC Executive Director John Arway. "The pilot program last year was such a huge hit with anglers and their friends and family that we decided to expand the program statewide in 2014. Adult anglers from across the state now will have a special day to fish with the children in their lives in advance of the traditional opening day of trout season."

The Mentored Youth Fishing Day pilot was launched in 2013 on the Saturday preceding the regional opening day of trout season and was immediately popular with adult anglers and the kids in their lives. More than 3,700 adult anglers registered 5,110 kids for the fishing opportunity.

"We expect to see an even higher level of involvement and enthusiasm this year since anglers have been sharing their stories about the great time they had in the pilot program," added Arway.

In our area, Mentored Youth Fishing Day will be held on 29 waters on April 5, the weekend before the traditional opening day of trout season.

Local waters include: Monroe - Hidden Lake and Pike - Lily Pond

To participate in the program, adult anglers (16 years of age or older) must possess a valid fishing license and trout/salmon permit and be accompanied by a youth. Youth anglers must obtain a free PFBC-issued permit, which will be available beginning Feb. 1, 2014, at www.GoneFishingPA.com or at any of the more than 900 licensing agents across the state.

A survey of participants in the pilot program found that 89 percent of the registered youth fished that day; a majority of mentors were family members; and more than 80 percent of the mentors said they were satisfied with the experience. All total, the kids and their mentors fished 7,727 hours and reported releasing 4,405 trout and harvesting 1,183. Nearly 80 percent of the mentors said they usually fish the opening day of trout season. However, more than one-third of respondents said that they do not typically take youth out on opening day.


