President, Brodheads Chapter of Trout Unlimited



t has been a busy summer with many opportunities to promote fly fishing and TU. In June, Bob Stevens, Joe Sadowski, Will Daskal, Mike Schwartz and I assisted *Project Healing Waters* with programs at Tobyhanna State Park. In July, we all met with Bob Eddy and his Fishing Club to fish Arrowhead Lakes with the veterans. We also fished at *Indian Mountain Rod & Gun Club* in August in their private section of stream.

In July, Spencer Yeakel, Will Daskal, Bob Stevens, Carl Meyer and I provided a fly fishing introduction to the campers at *Monroe County Conservation Camp*. Many of the thirty-five campers were able to quickly become adept at fly casting in a very short time. This youth group was very interested in trying the

equipment and asked questions that showed genuine interest in our sport. We have received letters of thanks from several of the campers that we sponsored, which are included this issue of *Streamside Asides*.

In August, several of us volunteered on short notice & were able to help the *Brodhead Watershed Association* with their *River Ramble* held at the *Brodhead Forest and Stream Association*. We were able to "ramble" on parts of the Paradise and Brodhead creeks not open to the public. There was an electro fishing demonstration, fishing history of the area, invasive and native plant information. A Revolutionary War grave site was also visited on the property.

Will Daskal and I went to *The PPL Environmental Center* on Lake Wallenpaupack, to take the *TU Coldwater Conservation Corps* training. This Corps of TU volunteers is being developed in response to the proliferation of drilling in the state for natural gas in Marcellus Shale. We were taught o test water for total dissolved solids, conductivity, pH, temperature, and to determine stream flow using stream cross section as the measurement (no velocity by timing a float is required). We were also trained in how to pick viable monitoring sites in relation to potential drilling sites. So far, we do not have any drilling permits in our immediate area, thanks to a moratorium in place in the Delaware River Basin. Gas drilling companies are flooding the TV with advertising trying to show how beneficial they are to the area's economy and how natural gas gained by hydraulic fracturing will solve the nation's energy needs, while preserving our environment. Using their websites you can learn about the process, check Citrus Energy's website for a computer video showing the process. Become informed and you will see how this is a threat to your watersheds, drinking water and fishing.



Our September Presentation will feature BILL KRAUSS, JR.

ill Krauss Jr. is a local master fly fisherman who began recording his trout catches while a junior in Allentown High School in 1953, when the trout season ended in July. Fifty-one trout were recorded that year. Thirty years later, in 1985, he recorded his 1000th trout. Numbers of trout caught have increased as the years have passed. By the end of 2010, his total of fish caught reached 67,119. While Bill has fished in ten different states, most of his trout have been caught in eastern PA. Bill's astonishing success rate will have you primed to learn about his fish-catching methods, and his opinions, based on fifty-seven years of trout fishing, often differ from what you have read in fishing literature. At our September 14th meeting, Bill will present ten fly fishing myths for your discussion. It should be one of the most interesting and entertaining meetings of the year!

elcome to the fly of the month! I'm happy to announce that we've decided to do something new with this feature starting with this month's fly. Thanks to a great idea from Joe Sadowski, we will be holding an ongoing FLY TYING CONTEST featuring the flies that appear in this column. Here's how it works: Members will receive their newsletter featuring the fly of the month for that particular month. Those wishing to participate in the contest can tie their fly and bring it to that month's general meeting. Flies will be labeled and collected by me, and I will take them home to judge them. The winner will be announced at the next month's general meeting. The prize, you ask? The lucky winner will have first choice of any of the fabulous items up for raffle at that month's meeting ,and the raffle table always has some very nice items from which to choose! The winner will also receive a Certificate of Achievement from the chapter, their winning fly mounted in a small glass dome, and, of course, bragging rights. All the flies submitted, except the winning fly, will be combined into a fly collection and become one of our annual banquet raffle prizes. It's a winning situation for all, and a lot of fun! So, without further ado, here is this month's fly (with some specifications for the contest participants): **ELK HAIR CADDIS**



HOOK: dry, size 14

THREAD: olive

HACKLE: ginger

RIB: gold wire, counter-wrapped

BODY: tan dubbing

WING: bleached elk or deer hair

TYING STEPS

- 1. Attach the thread to the hook at the eye and create a thread base to the bend. Return the thread to a point about 2 eye lengths from the front of the hook.
- 2. Tie in the gold wire as follows: hold the piece of wire underneath the hook on a 45 degree angle, and trap the wire underneath the hook with three loose wraps of thread. Then gently pull the wire back, aligning it with the shank of the hook, until the end of the wire buries itself underneath the thread wraps. Now continue to wrap the thread with more secure wraps along the shank of the hook until you reach the bend. This will effectively secure the wire to the hook and align it properly.
- 3. Tie in a ginger hackle by the butt end (as a general rule of thumb, dry fly hackle is tied in by the butt end, as opposed to wet fly hackle, which is tied in by the tip.) The length of the barbs should be roughly equal to the width of the gape of the hook.
- 4. Dub the body. Make sure to stop about 2 eve lengths back from the front of the hook to leave room for the wing.
- 5. Palmer wrap the hackle along the length of the body.
- 6. There are two tips I can offer you to help you effectively counterwrap the gold wire through the hackle without trapping too many barbs. First, take your scissors and trim the hackle barbs from the top of the hook. As you counterwrap the wire (that is, wrapping the wire in the opposite direction as the hackle), try to position it so that the wire crosses the hackle on top of the hook, at the points where you clipped the hackle barbs. Also, as you wrap the wire through the hackle barbs underneath the hook, wiggle the wire back and forth as you cross through the barbs. The goal here is to use the wire to reinforce the hackle quill without trapping the barbs. If done correctly, you should find that very few barbs are kinked or crimped by the wire wrap. Again, stop your wrap approximately 2 eye lengths back from the front of the hook to leave room for the wing.
- 7. Clip, clean, and stack a bunch of elk or deer hair and attach it on top of the hook in front of the body, tips projecting toward the rear of the hook but not projecting past the bend. Make about three wraps and then gently stroke the butt ends of the hair up, above the hook shank. This will help keep the hair clump on top of the hook and prevent it from rotating. Repeat this process several times over until you have about 10-15 wraps of thread securing the clump to the shank.

- 8. At this point, lift the butt ends and make a few wraps beneath them just behind the eye to lock the hair in place.
- 9. Whip finish the thread at this point also (under the butt ends just behind the eye of the hook), clip the thread and trim the butt ends such that they are as long as, but do not protrude longer than, the front of the hook. Cement the head and also the wraps that tied down your wing. Your caddis is now ready to fish (or to enter in our contest!)

For the contest, these are the specific criteria I will be looking for:

- A. Wing length and attitude it should extend to but not beyond the bend of the hook, and should rest at approximately a 45 degree angle above the hook.
- B. Wing fibers should not fall below the hook shank.
- C. Head of the wing should not extend further than the very front tip of the hook.
- D. The less trapped hackle barbs the better.
- E. Hackle barb length (about the width of the gape.)


