If You Look Around, You'll Learn Something

About 30 years ago I made the trek up Route 209, got off on a little side road, and stopped at a parking area near Egypt Mills. There wasn't much there: a few big white pines, an outdated restroom, some old fruit trees and a spot to park. Being in a hurry as I was there to fish, all sorts of interesting items around me went unnoticed. But as time went by and I revisited, (and I got older and slowed down) I began to nose

around.

remains of an old dam. A dam for what? A mill. Duh...Egypt Mills! I followed what looked like the old millrace until I came to the foundation of the mill house and sure enough there was the pit into which the millrace emptied. Scattered about were old ceramic-clad metal containers, complete with shot-shell holes. There was even a large piece of ironwork in the bottom of the pit. I continued down toward Route 209 and there was the millrace exit, a little stone edifice through which the waters of Toms Creek had flowed. After working to grind grain into various

types of flours, this is how

the water silently returned

to the creek.

Upstream, in and along the creek, there were a variety of concrete, stone, and wooden structures. These had been constructed with care, some more recently and some quite some time ago. Good stuff lasts. When I first visited, there were three fords of the creek, complete with timber and rock/rubble "bridges". The road was passable and still sometimes used by those who had access. No fallen trees blocked the way.

After years of snooping around in person, the rise of the Internet allowed me to snoop online. Now the pieces of the puzzle were starting to fit together.

This area originally belonged to the William Nyce family. It had a working farm with a sawmill and the grain mill. There was a smokehouse, ice house, a general store and the typical structures you'd find in a little village in the 1800's. This land stayed in the family until the late 1880's when it was purchased by the Egypt Mills Club, a private entity whose members, it appears, primarily lived in the Philadelphia area. The club

built many of the structures I had seen along the creek, including Landis Lake on top of the hill (named after the man in charge of facilities). There was a large clubhouse just in front of the present parking lot and the old fruit trees I had seen 30 years ago were in the back yard. The stumps from the large trees in front of the clubhouse are still there.

The Club existed until the Tocks Island Dam Project of 1960s had the federal government purchase the land. By about 1973-1974, the structures associated with the club and the old farm were demolished in preparation for the intended flooding of the valley.

A lot has changed for this place. The structures have crumbled, the dams have vanished and the fords are almost completely gone. The stream once again does what it wants. But a lot happened here and if I hadn't stopped to look around, I wouldn't have learned anything. Every time I fish here or anywhere else, I'm going to keep on looking!



Over the past few years waterways hiking trails have added immensely to the cultural enrichment and economic value of the towns and cities along Pennsylvania's many rivers and streams. They provide safe and convenient opportunities for recreation that improves our health and wellness. They also provide habitat protection and access for fishermen, hikers, bicyclists, birders, photographers, canoeists/kayakers and many other outdoor enthusiasts. Literally hundreds of trout filled tributaries flow into the rivers where these trails exist.

Come hear the inspiring stories of how the waterways trails concept began their construction methods, the funding programs that provided for them, the diverse sites, fascinating historic backgrounds, and the enthusiastic workers and many volunteers that have made them possible. This is a great opportunity for fisherman and all outdoors enthusiasts to appreciate, enjoy and learn more about these recreational treasures that are being built around the commonwealth and the country. John Shaner Reveals SOFT-HACKLE SECRETS!



John Shaner: I have been fly fishing for as long as I can remember and caught my first trout on a fly I tied myself in 1965. I grew up in the Finger Lakes region of New York and was fishing the Catskill Rivers as soon as I could drive.

Over the years I have fished for trout extensively across the US and have made several trips to England to fish the famous Chalk Streams and other rivers. I have a special love for Montana and Wyoming and I lived in West Yellowstone, MT for a number of years. My favorite rivers are; The West branch of the Delaware and Beaverkill, in New York, the Firehole and Madison system in

Yellowstone Park, and the Rivers Itchen, Eden, and Eamont in England.

I have also fished the Bahamas, Belize, and Florida for saltwater species.

I have worked in the fly fishing business since 1985 and have managed fly shops, guided, and worked as a sales representative for Orvis, Cortland Line, and is now Regional Fly Fishing Manager for Pure Fishing, covering the Hardy, Fenwick, Hodgman, and Pflueger Brands.

My interest in fly tying goes back to boyhood. I am mostly self-taught but have studied many techniques over the years and have a special interest in reproducing traditional trout fly patterns. I enjoy experimenting with new patterns, but am a bit of a traditionalist in my use of materials, and seldom incorporate synthetics into my flies, preferring natural silk, fur, and feathers.

About twenty years ago I developed a fascination for "Spiders" (Americans call them soft hackles), and enjoy tying and fishing these simple, elegant, and deadly flies.

Another interest is collecting classic tackle and angling books. My "library" (which is getting out of hand!) is primarily devoted to books detailing the development of flies and tying techniques.

Currently, I live in southern New York State, just a few minutes from the West Branch of the Delaware and Beaverkill.






