Teen Fly-Fishing Summer Camp

Registration is now open for teens 14 to 18 years of age for the Keystone/Trout Unlimited Teens Summer Conservation Camp. Trout Unlimited Chapters throughout NEPA and Keystone College are offering a one-week summer camp at which students reside in the Keystone dorms and eat in the cafeteria while studying conservation practices, the environment, and the art and the science of flyfishing. Instructors from environmental agencies such as DEP, DCNR, county conservation districts and the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission will offer instruction in watershed conservation, fisheries biology, aquatic insect identification and many other areas related to

environmental studies. Trout Unlimited volunteers will be on hand to teach the art of fly fishing including, casting, flytying, and matching the hatches of aquatic insects. University professors will share expertise in matters of the environment with Dr. Jerry Skinner of Keystone College conducting on-stream electro-shocking, fish inventory and classroom discoveries involving these fish. This is a great opportunity to learn to fly fish and develop life-long friendships and a life-long love for the outdoors.

Camp size is set at 24 teens of any experience and any background. Students who turn 18 during their senior year of high school, as long as they do not turn 18 before April 1st, are eligible. Separate quarters for male and female students are provided and students are grouped by age.



Opening Day. Those two words could keep me awake for a week as a young boy. Opening Day meant trout fishing and an adventure. I couldn't ask for anything more!

The first year or two I went with my father and older brother, the season started very early in the morning. We'd pack the car the night before and boy could my father pack. Every nook and cranny was filled with a can, box, or something of the appropriate size. It was a puzzle and he was the master and our job was to get all the stuff to him so he could make it work. After the car was loaded we went to bed for what was certainly a short, and fitful night's sleep. I mean, there were trout to catch so who could possibly doze off? This was serious business!



We crawled out of bed, had some breakfast and got in the car for the 1 1/2 hour ride to Big Poe Creek. It seemed to take forever to make that trip. I can remember drifting in and out, looking up and seeing the moon behind the trees as we bounced over the dirt and gravel road. Once we got over the mountain we traveled down the still-dark valley and found a place to park along the creek. The closer we got, the lighter it got and the more excited I became.

Now it was truly time to get serious. Boots? Check. Level-line fly rod? Check. Hooks? Check. Worms...where are the worms? Oh no, don't tell me we forgot them...whew, stuck behind the tail light area.

That was too close. All geared up and it was time for final instructions: Don't crowd other fisherman, approach slowly, work deep and keep your rod tip up. Then, it was time to go up the creek.

I can still hear and feel the sensation of the line in the guides when a trout took the worm and shook it around. It was a tap-tap-taptap-tap that I often still think about and I can remember how proud we were when we came back with some fish. I can remember snacking on the Oreos my mother packed and not telling her I didn't stop to wash my hands. Really, what's a little worm and fish stuff anyway? And I can remember happily drifting off to sleep on the way home, reliving all the catches, misses, and excitement I had just experienced.

John Shaner Reveals SOFT-HACKLE SECRETS!



John Shaner: I have been fly fishing for as long as I can remember and caught my first trout on a fly I tied myself in 1965. I grew up in the Finger Lakes region of New York and was fishing the Catskill Rivers as soon as I could drive.

Over the years I have fished for trout extensively across the US and have made several trips to England to fish the famous Chalk Streams and other rivers. I have a special love for Montana and Wyoming and I lived in West Yellowstone, MT for a number of years. My favorite rivers are; The West branch of the Delaware and Beaverkill, in New York, the Firehole and Madison system in

Yellowstone Park, and the Rivers Itchen, Eden, and Eamont in England.

I have also fished the Bahamas, Belize, and Florida for saltwater species.

I have worked in the fly fishing business since 1985 and have managed fly shops, guided, and worked as a sales representative for Orvis, Cortland Line, and is now Regional Fly Fishing Manager for Pure Fishing, covering the Hardy, Fenwick, Hodgman, and Pflueger Brands.

My interest in fly tying goes back to boyhood. I am mostly self-taught but have studied many techniques over the years and have a special interest in reproducing traditional trout fly patterns. I enjoy experimenting with new patterns, but am a bit of a traditionalist in my use of materials, and seldom incorporate synthetics into my flies, preferring natural silk, fur, and feathers.

About twenty years ago I developed a fascination for "Spiders" (Americans call them soft hackles), and enjoy tying and fishing these simple, elegant, and deadly flies.

Another interest is collecting classic tackle and angling books. My "library" (which is getting out of hand!) is primarily devoted to books detailing the development of flies and tying techniques.

Currently, I live in southern New York State, just a few minutes from the West Branch of the Delaware and Beaverkill.

quatic invasive species are species found outside their natural geographic range that cause ecological or economic harm, or harm to human health. Aquatic invasive species can be spread by human activities, such as boating, angling, and water gardening, to name a few. Preventing the introduction and spread of AIS should be a top priority in Pennsylvania as the state has more than 84,000 miles of streams, 77 miles of Great Lakes shoreline and many inland lakes, and shares five major watersheds with other states and Canada. In this talk, PASG's Sarah Whitney will present information about AIS of concern in Pennsylvania and highlight the steps boaters, anglers, and others can take to prevent the introduction and spread of AIS.
