

Bushkill Creek, Northampton County: Update

On Friday, June 5, 2020, Bushkill Creek, a Class A Wild Trout water near Tatamy, PA, went dry. Yes, dry. Not low, not extremely low, but dry—for about 14 hours. Thousands of fish were killed, from the Stockertown area through Tatamy and downstream near Easton. These fish, many of which were wild, stream-bred brown trout, slowly suffocated on the damp creek bed or in slowly warming pools of deoxygenating water. Local officials, Forks of the Delaware TU, and the PA Fish and Boat Commission responded and were on the scene that day.

How does such a thing happen?

Bushkill Creek's upstream waters run off the south side of Blue Mountain. They travel through Jacobsburg State

Park as a "freestoner" and meander south to Stockertown. This is where the creek encounters an underlying <u>carbonate geology</u> - limestone. Limestone is water soluble, meaning it can be eroded by groundwater. Over time, large, underground, water-filled voids form in the limestone which supports the overlaying rocks and soil. If the water table drops or enough limestone dissolves, the overlaying rocks and soil can collapse and form a sinkhole. There are several sinkholes that siphon water out of Bushkill Creek in this area. (You may want to do a

quick search for "karst topography.")

Located near Stockertown is a stone quarry that currently works below the water table. Whereas water will flow to the lowest point, groundwater that would normally fill the surrounding limestone voids and help feed the stream flows into the quarry. The water is pumped back up into the stream bed by massive electrical pumps. If the pumps fail, groundwater continues to infiltrate the quarry but with no water going back out, the creek dries up.

That's what happened on June 4-5 when a lightning strike cut off power to the pumps.

De-watering of the creek has occurred before, with most recent events happening in 2013 and 2018. This 2020 event appears to have had the longest duration and thus the potential to inflict the most damage to the ecosystem.

A Class A Wild Trout stream is a High Quality stream. A High Quality stream has and deserves protection from degradation and events that would cause it to lose its status. As we wait and see how this is handled, we encourage you to speak with your elected officials and urge them to formulate and coordinate a responsible solution to prevent such an egregious event from occurring (yet) again. A creek should not look like a Martian landscape.

Fishing Report

Well, the reports we're getting indicate the fish are enjoying the late spring weather as the fatten up on a variety of adult and juvenile insect froms. And it also appears that getting out to do some fishing is a very popular thing to do when you can't go to work or need to escape from the house. Keeping our streams clean and fit for fish and fishermen has taken on a new importance in the shadow of COVID-19.

So, what's going on?





Sulphurs are currently hatching on streams like the Brodhead Creek, McMichaels Creek, Appenzell Creek, Martins Creek and Cherry Creek. Hatches seem to be coming off around 7:30 PM (give or take) and adult, emerger and spinner patterns will work as the night goes on. Size #14-#16 should do the job. Isonychia or Slate Drakes are also hatching on area streams. Size #14 is a safe bet and a rusty spinner in the same size is also a good idea to have in your box. Warm, rainy June mornings can give rise (no pun intended) to a really good Blue Wing Olive hatch on waters such as the Brodhead. Again, size

#14 is a good place to start but could go up to a #12. You might see some Light Cahills coming off at dusk, too, so it's a good idea to have some #14s of those. Of course, we still have a variety

of caddis hatching (carry emergers and adults) and we should start to see some Yellow Sallies soon. Size #16 - #14 is normal for these little stoneflies you'll find in the cool, tributary streams.

As we head into summer, remember to keep the temperature of the water in mind. Brown trout get stressed above 68 degrees Fahrenheit and brookies around 65 degrees. If it warms up too much, head out to the lake or pond and get some bluegills and pumpkinseeds. You can practice your casting accuracy by seeing how close to the weed bed you can put a size #8 popper!




