We've received some exciting news since we last spoke; the Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited has won a \$7000 Embrace A Stream Grant through TU National for our proposed work on the McMichaels Creek. That also enters us into the Embrace A Stream Challenge, The Embrace A Stream Challenge is a fundraising opportunity for the chapter to move closer to having funds in place for the proposed habitat improvements on the McMichaels Creek. Every \$10 or more donated is an opportunity for matching grants and prizes from Orvis.

On Saturday, November 13, we are looking forward to spending part of our afternoon exploring the new Pocono Heritage Land Trust acquisition, the Rail Gap Pocono Creek Preserve. We will be looking for evidence of spawning trout, discussing potential improvement projects, and learning a little more about this new public access.

The ORVIS – Trout Unlimited Embrace A Stream Challenge

The Orvis—Trout Unlimited Embrace A Stream Challenge is an online fundraising event running from 12:00 AM on November 8th through 3 AM on November 15, 2021. The Challenge provides opprotunnities for members and friends to reach out via social media platforms and traditional web and email systems. Designed to enhance fundraising for local projects, the Orvis company will graciously match donations up to \$1000 for each participating Trout Unlimited chapter. So if a chapter raises \$1500, Orvis chips in \$1000 and the final disbursement is \$2500. That's a great deal!



Locally, Brodhead Trout Unlimited is working with the Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission, the Pocono Heritage Land Trust and Hamilton Township on trout habitat improvements in McMichaels Creek. This stretch of creek runs through the Trust's Pomeroy McMichaels Nature Preserve off Hickory Valley Road near Stroudsburg.

Phase I of this project has estimated materials, equipment and labor costs of approximately \$62,000. Currently, through active fundraising and grant writing, the Chapter has \$47,000 to put toward this total. Although looking to pursue additional grant funding, there is nothing guaranteed so all funds raised through this EAS Challenge are extremely important. And don't forget Phase II!

BTU Instructs At

Introduction To Fly Fishing Workshop

On Sunday, October 24, members of the Brodhead Chapter of Trout Unlimited served as lead instructors at an Introduction to Fly Fishing workshop at the Brodhead Creek Heritage Center in Analomink. Ten enthusiastic students rotated through active, handon sessions covering equipment, casting, knot tying, macroinvertebrates and reading the stream. After the instruction phase, participants traveled to Zacharias' Pond and put their newly learned skills to work. Good luck and tight lines to all in the future.













Committee Updates

Brodhead TU has several active committees focused upon meeting the needs identified in our Strategic Plan. If you would like to volunteer to serve on one of these committees, please contact a Board member at your convenience. Below are brief descriptions of what each committee does and some actions they have recently undertaken.

Advocacy— Advocacy alerts members of upcoming policy and/or legislative changes that can impact the cold-water resources in the Poconos, the state, and the nation. Legislation that heads through the House and Senate in Harrisburg has the potential to directly or indirectly affect the coldwater fisheries throughout the state. See pages 7 and 8 for more details.

Diversity Initiative— Focuses upon strengthening the chapter by providing information and activities that will attract and retain members across the spectrum found within our communities. In line with TU National's Harassment Policy, the Chapter continues advertising and providing a link for reporting of harassing activities. This is a vital step in creating and maintaining an atmosphere that welcomes all persons interested in BTU's activities.

Fundraising— BTU received a TU Embrace-A-Stream grant of \$7,000 towards the Pomeroy-McMichaels Creek project. As stated last month, BTU also applied for a PFBC Cooperative Habitat Improvement Project (CHIP) grant with the PFBC and they notified us we will receive \$5,600. They will also provide \$17,200 in labor and associated costs. Our current total raised for materials and labor is \$47,000. Projected materials and labor costs for this phase of the project are \$62,000 Next event is the **Orvis-TU Embrace a Stream** Challenge running from Nov 8-15. Orvis will match up to \$1000 and more information is found on page 3 and <u>here.</u> The committee will continue to pursue grant opportunities and other fundraising activities.

Conservation— Pomeroy work plans await final funding and coordination with PFBC. The committee also is soliciting input for additional work sites in the future. Recent flooding has had a significant, negative impact on some of our past projects and it may be time to re-address those needs. Stay tuned as the ideas are coming quickly!

Tree Planting– Committee members met with representatives of the Polk Township Parks and Recreation Committee on October 23rd. Discussion focused upon 35'to 50' buffers along the creek, plant types and planting activities. Included would be a clear walkway to the water, possibly a rain garden and some larger trees. Followup meetings will occur after the holidays. At the Josie Porter Farm, the foci are now some invasive plant removal/native tree plantings in the riparian buffer zone and a run-off area on the south side of the creek.

<u>PA Legislative News:</u> The 2021 Legislative Session re-opens on Monday, **November 8, 2021** and committees in both the House and Senate are active. Bills of of note:

- H.B. 1842. Last amended on October 4, 2021, the House Environmental Resources and Energy Committee voted this out of committee. The bill, a companion bill to S.B. 545 below, utilizes some of 545's language. Again, it would allow non-professional judgments on attempted clean-ups and seeks to tie pollution to only specific, numerical thresholds. The bill is on the table in the House.
- H.B. 1144. This bill passed the House and is still in Environmental Resources and Energy in the Senate. No recent status change. This bill would legalize the dumping of oil and gas drilling wastewater on gravel and paved roads. PSU has conducted two studies indicating such actions have detrimental effects on the environment.
- 3. <u>S.B. 545.</u> Re-referred back to the Appropriations Committee on September 21, 2021, (As of 11/4/2021, it is not listed on-line as being in committee.) This re-write of last session's failed S.B. 619, would allow polluters to determine if they should or should not report a spill. Existing law requires spills to be reported to DEP where trained professionals determine the severity and ecological impact of the spill. Seeks to tie pollution to only specific, numerical thresholds.
- 4. <u>S.B. 832.</u> Out of committee and given first consideration on Sept. 28, 2021. Would establish a new fund dedicated to water quality, specifically focused on mitigating "non-point" sources of pollution, such as agricultural runoff and acid mine drainage, that are diffuse throughout the landscape. Funding in the amount of \$250 million dollars would be appropriated from federal dollars allocated by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

Be advised there are usually multiple bills being considered that could ultimately affect the quality of our streams and groundwater.

Fall/Winter Fishing Outlook

Trout Spawning Season in Full Swing

Now that the November coolness has brought the water temperatures down into the upper 40's, it's apparent that spawning season is in full swing. As the waters recede from the lastest high-water event, expect to see active trout in your favorite, small-stream waterway. Remember:

- They build their redds in the tail-out flats of pools and runs from now through early December. Please be careful with your wading (look for those "clean" oval patterns on the bottom—see photo at right) and don't target fish that are near the redds.
- Recent floods have had some major impacts on our waterways. Be careful with your wading as new cuts, runs, and strainers have been created. What once was there, may not be now!



- 3. As the waters cool and the fishing heats up, don't forget those streamers in your fly box. Honestly, they work! And as the fall feed provides calories for trout to sustain them through the leaner winter months, they look for as many calories as possible. A weighted zonker or bugger run deep can produce some really nice fish.
- 4. Remember to keep 'em wet and release quickly.






