I'm using my newsletter space to thank our volunteers who have gone above and beyond to make our Chapter a success this month.

On May 13, 14 and 15 we had a STREAM Girls Program. 16 Girl Scouts ranging from 10 to 14 years old were given instruction on stream ecology, fly casting, macroinvertebrates, flow measurements, and fly tying. I would like to thank Ann Foster, Tara Ricker, Todd Burns, Glen Lippencott, Gloria Rubino, Brooke Halstead, and Tina Merli for giving a portion of their weekend to help me make this a worth-while experience for the Scouts.

On May 22, Brian Mc Donnell and Todd Burns assisted me in clearing about a 10th of an acre of invasive plants at the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge Larsen Tract. Thank you again to Todd and Brian. Also a big thank you to Landon Lewis of the USFWS staff for his assistance and instruction on herbicide application.

On June 4 Sally Rosen, Amy Baird, Caius Baird, Matt Greco, Joe Greco, and Todd Burns assisted me in planting 300 trees and shrubs at the Larsen Lane Tract of the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge. This was done to mitigate against impact of the emerald ash borer that has decimated the overstory on the site and led to the proliferation of invasive species. Once again Landon Lewis of the USFWS was instrumental in helping with this project.

We have some more volunteer opportunities this month and we could really use your help. On June 18 and July 16 we have veterans fishing events starting at 9AM. On June 25 we are hosting an Introduction to Fly Fishing Class. We have a full class of 24 students registered and could use some volunteers to help with casting instruction and that event runs from 9AM to 12PM, with a fishing opportunity after the class. On June 28 we are providing fly fishing instruction to Urban Youth Volunteers at the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge from 10:30AM to 12PM, and all volunteers are invited to a venison lunch following the class. On July 21 we are providing fly fishing instruction at the Monroe County Conservation Camp from 1PM to 3PM, volunteers are invited to join the camper for lunch from 12PM to 1PM. STREAM Girls Program at Camp Minsi

Brodhead TU volunteers worked cooperatively with the Girls Scouts on May 13-15, 2022, in conducting a STREAM Girls Program. Girl Scouts ranging from 10 to 14 years old were given instruction on stream ecology, fly casting, macroinvertebrates, flow measurements, and fly tying. In total, 16 scouts participated. Volunteers Ann Foster, Tara Ricker, Todd Burns, Glen Lippencott, Gloria Rubino, Brooke Halstead, and Tina Merli provided instruction and guidance for various workshop segments. Adults and

scouts alike enjoyed the time outside and the many learning opportunities.











Volunteers Remove Invasive Species, Plant Native Trees and Shrubs

In late May and early June BTU volunteers visited the Larsen Lane Tract of the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge to work on removing invasive plants and planting native species. Invasive species in our riparian areas take advantage of the existing conditions to squeeze out and overtake the native species. Whereas the native species evolved in their natural habitat to fulfill a specific niche and/or function, the invasive populations will grow but fail to fill those niches and the ecosystem changes. These changes can lead to long-term negative consequences for our waterways. A contributing factor to the influx of invasives on this tract was the death of the native ash trees.



The area within the Larsen Lane tract is large, and it is overwhelmed by Russian olive, Japanese barberry and multi-flora rose. Vounteers cut these plants near to the ground and sponged a herbicide on the exposed tissue. This application technique is designed to kill the root of the plant, not just trim it back. Two weeks after the initial clearing activity, a second group of volunteers arrived with some native species of trees and shrubs to plant within the cleared area. The wetter areas near the creek received plantings of river birch, black willow, silky dogwood, sandbar willow, buttonbush and maple leaf viburnum. The hillside leading to the creek welcomed sweet gum, spicebush and chokeberry.

Work on this tract will be a challenging, years-long project. But successfully addressing the issue and helping the native species regain the upper hand will be a benefit to this stretch of riparian land along Cherry Creek.

News Notes, Advocacy Opportunities, and Items of Interest

<u>The Governor's budget address</u> occured on Tuesday, February 8, 2022. Here is a <u>preview article</u> highlighting the components of the proposed budget.

PA Legislative News: Committees in both the House and Senate have been active. Bills of of note:

- I. H.B. 2020. (No change) Referred to the House ERE on February 3, 2022. Growing Greener III. For fiscal year 2021-2022, the fund would be appropriated \$500,000,000 from money received by the Commonwealth from the Federal Government under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (Public Law 117-2, 135 Stat. 4). Would fund a variety of infrastructure and positive environmental projects.
- 2. H.B. 1842. (Updated) Re-Referred to Senate Appropriations Committee on Feb. 7. The bill was sent to the floor on Dec. 14, 2021 where it passed by a 108-95 roll-call vote. The bill, a companion bill to S.B. 545 below, utilizes some of 545's language. It was given first Senate consideration on January 25, 2022. It would allow non-professional judgments on attempted clean-ups of potentially dangerous spills and seeks to tie pollution to only specific, numerical thresholds.
- 3. <u>S.B. 545.</u> (No change) Re-referred to Appropriations Committee on September 21, 2021, This rewrite of last session's failed S.B. 619, would allow polluters to determine if they should or should not report a spill. (See H.B. 1842 above.) Existing law requires spills to be reported to DEP where trained professionals determine the severity and ecological impact of the spill.
- 4. <u>H.B. 1144.</u> This bill passed the House and is still in Environmental Resources and Energy in the Senate. <u>No recent status change.</u> This bill would legalize the dumping of oil and gas drilling wastewater on gravel and paved roads. A recent <u>PSU study</u> indicates such actions have detrimental effects on the environment and are not the best tools for the job.
- 5. <u>S.B. 832.</u> (No Change) Currently in Appropriations Committee. Would establish a new fund dedicated to water quality, specifically focused on mitigating "non-point" sources of pollution, such as agricultural runoff and acid mine drainage, that are diffuse throughout the landscape. Funding of \$250 million dollars would be appropriated from federal dollars allocated by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

After reviewing these bills and their summaries, please contact your senator and relay your thoughts.

If you want to keep track of these and other bills coming up within the Environmental Resources and Energy Committees (ERE) here is the link for the <u>House</u>. Here is the same information for <u>Game and Fisheries</u>. On the Senate side, here are <u>ER&E</u> and <u>G&F</u> committee assignments and meeting schedules. Be advised there are usually multiple bills being considered that could ultimately affect the quality of our streams and groundwater.

Well, the month of May flew by and with it quite a few of our local hatches. But fear not, there are still a lot of bugs out there for our trout to feed upon.

As we've entered June, be prepared to see significant numbers of Yellow Sallies (#16-#18) flitting above the water. We still have some caddis with sizes and colors ranging from #16-#20 and from grey to green. On those cloudy, rainy morning look for the Cornutas or blue-winged olives(#14). These mayflies are already hatching and several of our members reported seeing them on the water with the trout very interested. The fish really like to look up for this hatch so carry your favorite pattern—and a raincoat!





You may still find some Sulphurs (probably #16 now) and possibly Light Cahills (#14-#16) emerging from the riffles at evening dusk and their spinners will fall around dark. (A repeated hint: Carry a little flashlight so you can see to get out safely.) As stated last month, fish the emergers (usually with a trailing brown shuck), then the duns, and then the rusty spinners. There is nothing quite like fishing in the near dark, hearing trout slurping spinners while you're trying to figure out where your fly is drifting. Oh yeah, you may get spinners of different bugs coming by at the same time. Just another bit of challenge to overcome.

Water conditions right now are very good. With some consistent and frequent rains (not torrential downpours) the month of June can be a great time to be on the water. However, please be aware of the water temperatures. As the water levels drop and the days become warmer. wa-

ter temperatures in many of our streams can creep above 68 degrees. It's best for the trout f they don't need to exert themselves when the water gets warm. So when things heat up this summer, hit the ponds or the Delaware River for some warmwater action until things cool down.


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
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
