

May was a busy month for the Brodhead Chapter. As you'll see in the pages of this issue of Streamside Asides, we hosted and participated in numerous education and conservation events throughout the month, and more are planned in June.

A key focus for the chapter is always on supporting youth education and our volunteers outdid themselves this month.

On page 4, you'll see photos from the May 5 Stroudsburg High School Trout in the Classroom release day where students released the trout they raised during the school year. Our volunteers were joined by U.S. Fish and Wildlife service staff to introduce students to the science behind healthy fisheries as well as fly-fishing and fly-tying at several stations.

At mid-month, the chapter hosted our third annual Stream Girls event. Held over a weekend at Hickory Run State Park, Brodhead TU volunteers introduced another local Girl Scout troop to this Trout Unlimited program designed to introduce the science of the outdoors to the next generation of conservationists and anglers.

Last year, approximately 150 youth participated in Brodhead TU sponsored TIC programs and other educational opportunities through our volunteer efforts.

Overall last fiscal year, from April 2022 through March 2023, Brodhead TU volunteers gave over 2,165 hours of their time to support the chapter in its mission. That is a tremendous achievement and a number we hope to continue to grow in the future. Keep your eye out for upcoming volunteer opportunities in these pages as well as our weekly email newsletter.






Stroudsburg High School TIC Release Day

On May 5, students from Stroudsburg High School visited the Headquarters Tract of the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge for their Trout In The Classroom (TIC) release day. The students released their trout into Cherry Creek and then BTU members lead instructional activities at various stations. Don Miller led a stream walk along Cherry Creek, Todd Burns demonstrated fly-tying,

Brian McDonnell conducted a knot-tying session and Larry and Lisa Ott oversaw the fly casting session.





The students and our volunteers had an enjoyable morning and the chapter looks forward to next year's event.

Riparian Buffer Maintenance

Saturday, May 6, saw BTU volunteers visited two tree-planting sites to conduct ongoing maintenance. Todd Burns, Eric and Caius Baird, and Brian McDonnell revisited our work sites at the Polk Township Walking Park and the Larson Tract of the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge (CVNWR). The work involved straightening tree tubes, re-driving stakes and cleaning out debris.

The Polk Township site is doing well although we'll see how this excessive dryness affects the younger plantings. At Larsen, those plantings on the hillside and down in the creek bottom seem to be doing well, also.

STREAM Girls Event

STREAM Girls is Trout Unlimited's watershed STEM program for girls that builds confidence and breaks down barriers in science and the outdoors. Through the eyes of a scientist, artist and angler, girls make a personal connection to their home waters. The weekend of May 20 -21 saw BTU volunteers and friends assist with a STREAM Girls event at Hickory Run State Park. Throughout the weekend, the girls participating in water-related activities. These included: a stream walk, calculations of water flow from in-stream measurements, macroinverte-brate sampling and identification, fly tying and casting, a scavenger hunt and some fishing. Thanks to Eric Baird, Jacob Smith, Ann Foster, Matt Evans, and Larry and Lisa Ott for their assistance with the program.





News Notes, Advocacy Opportunities, and Items of Interest



BTU Position Statement on Distribution Centers/Warehouse Construction

Discussions are being carried out concerning the construction of distribution centers throughout the Pocono region. Proposed projects are in various stages of planning, review, comment and hearings in Coolbaugh Township, Tunkhannock Township and Pocono Township. Potentially affected streams and their associated wetlands and tributaries are Mud Pond Run, Pocono Creek and Tobyhanna Creek.

BTU understands warehouse development will occur, and it believes that such development must be done in areas that do not impact the absorption, retention, filtration and free movement of rain water and other precipitation near cold-water resources. It should not reduce the size or quality of wetlands, provide damaging thermal and/or saline stress due to runoff, or cause increased siltation in our streams. The cold, clean trout waters for which the Poconos is known should not be degraded and BTU is willing to work with residents and local governments to achieve this goal.

Last month, we were talking about receding flood waters. Now, we're concerned about drought-like conditions. For a few days (through June 11), the nighttime temperatures will be in the upper 40s and the days in the low 70s. Even with exceptionally low flows, the water temperatures will stay cold enough to provide good conditions for the trout. Once we start getting periods of 80 degree days and 60+ degree nights, it will be time to start thinking about some warmwater fishing.

The sulphurs and blue-winged olives arrived on-time. You may still catch some sulphur duns and spinners at dusk and certainly some BWOs in the mornings. Size #14 for the BWO should work. If there is little feeding activity on the surface, give a small BWO nymph a try. You might be surprised at the size of trout that will bother with a tiny little nymph! (That's a hint.)Yellow sallies (golden stones) are out and about and are usually a good choice. Maybe a #16. Green and tan caddis are also out in the mornings and size #18 may be a good place to start.

Upcoming hatches include the Isonychia or Slate Drakes, the Light Cahills, and some tricorythodes (#20 -#22).

While sometimes not as plentiful as the May hatches, June insect activity in the Pocono streams can produce some quality action. That, of course, can lead to some marvelous fishing opportunities. Get out while you can and remember to give those trout a break when water temperatures get above 68 degrees. Good luck and tight lines!
