## Brodhead Trout Unlimited Acts To Improve Stream Habitat And Riparian Buffers

Since its chartering in 1977, the Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited engaged in efforts to conserve natural waterways, improve in-stream habitats and secure and improve the important riparian areas along Pocono streams. Those efforts continue to this day, 47 years later. A look at the table below shows the Chapter's projects over the last 4-5 years.

### News Notes, Advocacy Opportunities, and Items of Interest



#### BTU Position Statement on Distribution Centers/Warehouse Construction

Discussions are being carried out concerning the construction of distribution centers throughout the Pocono region. Proposed projects are in various stages of planning, review, comment and hearings in Coolbaugh Township, Tunkhannock Township and Pocono Township. Potentially affected streams and their associated wetlands and tributaries are Mud Pond Run, Pocono Creek and Tobyhanna Creek.

BTU understands warehouse development will occur, and it believes that such development must be done in areas that do not impact the absorption, retention, filtration and free movement of rain water and other precipitation near cold-water resources. It should not reduce the size or quality of wetlands, provide damaging thermal and/or saline stress due to runoff, or cause increased siltation in our streams. The cold, clean trout waters for which the Poconos is known should not be degraded and BTU is willing to work with residents and local governments to achieve this goal.



#### Remember: Change of Regulations on Tobyhanna Lake

(Inland trout regulations still apply prior to lake drawdown in spring 2025.)

Comments may be submitted by mail to: Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P.O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, within 30 days after publication of the notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Electronic submission can be made to RA-pfbcregulations@pa.gov. As before, just be sure to identify which proposal you are commenting upon.

#### **Change In Method to Comment On Proposed Regulatory Changes**

Until the end of 2023, PFBC accepted comments on upcoming regulatory proposals through email and a web-based application, in addition to regular mail. Moving forward, comments will need to be made via mail or the email RA-pfbcregulations@pa.gov . The proposed regulations are still posted on line for your review BUT they are on the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* site. To review the proposed changes, you will need to navigate by following the steps below:

- 1. Click on this **Pennsylvania Bulletin link**.
- 2. Under "BULLETIN", select the most recent volume.
- 3. Select the most recent issue(s).
- 4. Select "Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission" from the menu. You will see any pending proposals as a hyperlink
- 5. Select the proposal and it should open so you can read it.

Not much has changed since our February column. Air temperatures have remained seasonably cold, our lakes are frozen over and the streams are running low, clear and cold. But that doesn't mean the fish aren't feeding or you shouldn't give it a try.

Streamers, nymphs and midge patterns are probably your best bets as far as offerings from a fly-fishing perspective. Minnow-like plugs and spinners can be productive on the spinning gear side. Time of day to fish is really your choice. Baitfish imitations in the morning and later afternoon hours are a good bet as are small nymphs and midge pupae patterns during the mid-day hours.

Something to keep in mind as you plan your fishing in February: sections of streams stocked with trout by the PA Fish and Boat Commission close to fishing at midnight, February 16, 2025, and don't re-open to fishing until 8:00 AM on April 5, 2025. Please refer to the <u>Summary of Regulations</u> for a listing of area trout streams <u>and their sections</u> so you don't get yourself in trouble!



Of course, as with many things in life, there are exceptions. Special Regulation waters provide angling opportunities year-round. Again, a listing of these waters and their specific requirements can be found in the summary linked above on pages 16-17 and 35-36 for our Northeast Region.

And now, to the "age old" question: What about trout <u>stream</u> <u>sections</u> that aren't stocked? Can you fish in them between February 17 and April 5? Well, there are two types—<u>Class A trout waters</u> and non-Class A trout waters. Taken directly from the 2025 Summary of Regulations:

"NOTE: It is legal to fish for trout in Class A streams year-round, with no harvest beginning the day after Labor Day to the opening day of trout season the following year. The exception is those stream sections designated as both Class A Wild Trout Streams and Stocked Trout Waters (Miscellaneous Special Regulations—see pages 16 and 17). These stream sections are closed to fishing from February 17 until 8 a.m. on the opening day of trout."

Pay particular attention to Class A stream sections as some streams will have different regulations in different sections! Do your homework. And if the waterway is unstocked but not listed as Class A? We'll let you review the Summary and figure that one out!


