

Summer Slam On-Line Auction

The Brodhead Chapter Trout Unlimited will once again be sponsoring their <u>Summer Slam Online Auction</u>. Running from September 7 through September 14, the auction offers new, used, and collectible items for members, friends and the general public.

Some of this year's items include an original Fye (now Richardson) chest fly box from the 1951-1961 era, a new 10' 3-weight Euro rod with a blank directly from Bulgaria (with Lamson reel), a new 7' 6" 4 weight fly rod, a used Hardy Perfect reel, a framed fishing stamp collection autographed/inscribed by Lefty Kreh, and a nice selection of nymphs.

Initiated in 2020, the auction has evolved into the second largest fundraiser for the chapter. Data Centers Arrive in Latest Development Push

As the push for construction of more distribution center space continues in the Pocono region, a new land use is also gaining attention: Data centers.

While a small data center may fit into a room of a building, the data centers being proposed encompass an entire building or a series of buildings. They are designed to house large-scale computing systems associated with various enterprises such as e-commerce and telecommunications. With the explosion of artificial intelligence (AI) in the past decade, the demand for data centers has grown rapidly.

The tremendous scale of the computing designs within these complexes requires large amounts of energy. The bigger the data center, the more computing power is at play, and the greater the amount of energy required. The more energy used, the more heat that is generated and the need to cool these systems grows. The two largest uses of energy within a data center are the energy to run the servers and the energy needed to keep them cool. There are several methods currently in use to cool the systems so they function optimally. Some can be cooled via traditional air conditioning while other may utilize a closed-loop or other heat-transfer method. These methods may need to access local freshwater resources.

Data centers may tie into existing high-voltage power lines or they may use on-site gas turbines or other means to generate the electricity they need. The energy source used will depend upon the scale of the facility and the energy resources available.

Currently, the largest proposal that has progressed in our region is located in Covington and Clifton Townships. This proposed data center along I-380 would possibly involve more than 30 buildings and 1,000 acres of land.

Recently, Pennsylvania Senate, SB 939 was referred to the Communications and Technology Committee on July 14. This bill would establish an Office of Transformation and Opportunity and the Artificial Intelligence and a Data Center and Emerging Technology Regulatory Sandbox Program.

From a cold-water conservation perspective, several concerns arise with the proposal of large-scale data centers. As with any large-area construction, removal of trees, shrubs and grasses that hold soils in place may lead to downstream sedimentation. Additionally, the capture of runoff from large roofs or parking areas produces warm waters that must be cooled prior to entering our surface waterways. And if a cooling system utilizes cold surface waters or lowers an aquifer level via high-volune wells, diminished cold-water flows will be an issue.

BTU will be watching these developments.

BTU Position Statement on Distribution Centers/Warehouse Construction

Discussions are being carried out concerning the construction of distribution centers throughout the Pocono region. Proposed projects are in various stages of planning, review, comment and hearings in Coolbaugh Township, Tunkhannock Township and Pocono Township. Potentially affected streams and their associated wetlands and tributaries are Mud Pond Run, Pocono Creek and Tobyhanna Creek.

BTU understands warehouse development will occur, and it believes that such development must be done in areas that do not impact the absorption, retention, filtration and free movement of rain water and other precipitation near cold-water resources. It should not reduce the size or quality of wetlands, provide damaging thermal and/or saline stress due to runoff, or cause increased siltation in our streams. The cold, clean trout waters for which the Poconos is known should not be degraded and BTU is willing to work with residents and local governments to achieve this goal.



Monroe County Addition to Class A Trout Waters

Forest Hills Run is now proposed to be listed for inclusion on the Class A Wild Trout water listings by the PA Fish & Boat Commission. This proposal is published in the PA Bulletin (Volume 55, Issue 53) and is open to comment. We strongly urge you to submit comments in favor of approving the listed stream sections. Deadline for comments is Sun-

day, September 14. Forest Hills Run, Tank Creek, Yankee Run, Devils Hole Creek, Rattlesnake Creek and Mill Creek are vital tributaries to Brodhead Creek and serve as cold-water refuges and spawning areas. Lets be sure our voices are heard in support of identifying Forest Hills Run as the Class A water it truly is.

Comments may be submitted by mail to: Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P.O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, within 30 days after publication of the notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Electronic submission can be made to RA-pfbcregulations@pa.gov. As before, just be sure to identify which proposal you are commenting upon.

Method to Comment On Proposed Regulatory Changes

To review the proposed changes in regulation, you need to navigate by following the steps below:

- 1. Click on this **Pennsylvania Bulletin link**. (Or the link highlighted above.)
- 2. Under "BULLETIN", select the most recent volume.
- 3. Select the pertinent issue(s).
- 4. Select "Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission" from the menu. You will see any pending proposals as a hyperlink. Select the proposal and it will open so you can read it.

It's been a long, hot and especially dry summer in the Poconos and that hasn't provided conditions ripe for trout fishing. But air temperatures in the area are gradually dropping and we're getting some nice, cool evenings. Now we desperately need some rain, and quite a bit of it. And hopefully not all at once! If the current conditions last, trout fishing will be a challenge in the foreseeable future. However, since our weather is variable, let's look at what happens in a more "normal" year.

As September progresses and water temperatures cool, our brook and brown trout will begin to stock up on calories in preparation for the upcoming spawning seasons (October through December.) Now can be a good time to try some terrestrial patterns such as beetles, small hoppers, and ants. With some rain and elevated flows, streamers can be an effective way to generate some explosive strikes.

We can see some late season hatches with small Blue-winged Olives and Isonychia or Slate Drakes flitting about. As always, don't forget your nymph and emerger patterns

for these insects.



Although we'll remind you in October, spawning seasons are right around the corner. That means being careful where you tread in the creeks. If our waters remain low, there will be less areas available to spawn and competition for the "right" areas will increase. We don't want to create any more issues for our wild and native trout.

Let's hope for some rain, cool nights, and many tight lines!


